
Benefits Of Long Days

We've survived the shortest day of the year and we are once again headed towards longer daily doses of sunshine. We humans generally know how daylight and sunshine affects us, but have we thought about how it affects our livestock? Although the mechanisms are largely unknown, study upon study have shown the long days typical of summertime (and even longer days than NC summers) increase milk production as compared with short days of wintertime. We also know that this effect is rather short-lived because creatures eventually stop responding to a day-length signal that does not change over time.

How can we use this information to our benefit on our dairy farms? Ideally, we should provide our pregnant dairy heifers and cows with a short-day photo signal of about 8 hours per day. Once they calve, ideally they will see 16 hours of light maintained a booth at the NC Catper day as a long-day photoperiod.

They respond to this fresh long-day signal by increasing dry matter intake and shortly thereafter increasing milk production. The intensity of light they see can be important, but generally speaking, if you can read a newspaper at the eye level of the cattle in question, that is bright enough.

The graph below shows how many hours of supplemental light are required during the year to provide the long-day benefits in North Carolina. Simply keeping lights on 24 hours a day not only wastes electricity and bulb life, but tends to confuse normal circadian rhythms. Since it's tough to be consistent turning lights on and off, simple timers are the best method to control photoperiod in our livestock facili-



Some utility providers will provide financial assistance to clients who upgrade their electrical appliances. This could include new efficient LED lights as well as timers, among other things. 
