

<u>October</u>

Ornamentals & Houseplants

- Plant pansies for cool weather color.
- Continue dividing perennials.
- Dig & store tender bulbs like dahlias & caladiums. Let them dry out and store layered in newspaper in a cool dark place.
- Bring in any remaining houseplants or tender perennials. Inspect carefully for insects. Quarantine for treatment as needed.

Edibles

- Garlic planting can begin this month. Bulb onions can be planted from seed now too.
- Dig and harvest sweet potatoes before first frost.
- Harvest remaining tomatoes. Ripen inside or cook some fried green tomatoes.
- Harvest and hang up hot peppers to dry.
- Remove remaining summer vegetable plants and debris. Don't compost any diseased plant material.
- If you don't have cool weather crops planted, now is a great time to amend your vegetable garden according to your soil test. Add compost. Top with mulch or a cover crop.

Lawns

- Mow newly seeded areas when they reach 4-5". Mow to no less than 3".
- Keep fallen leaves cleared away from lawn.

Trees & Shrubs

- Continue planting trees & shrubs.
- Don't prune trees & shrubs it could trigger new growth with will be susceptible to cold damage. But you can always trim dead, diseased, damaged and dangerous branches.

Miscellaneous

- Consider leaving flower stalks and stems in place for winter interest and to provide habitat for native bees.
- Cover any water features with light mesh netting to keep out falling leaves.
- If you haven't done a soil test yet, there is still time! Tests are free through the end of November.
